

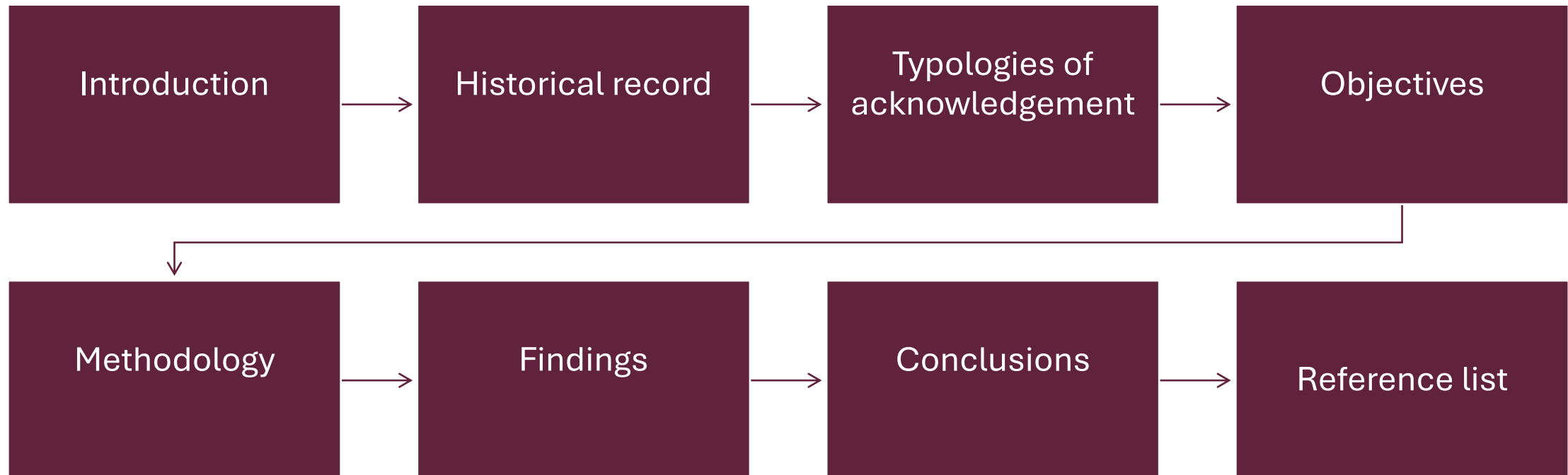

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Introduction

- Role include collecting, preserving, archiving and distributing
- Play a role in sustainable human development
- Previously resources in physical formats
- Emergence of technology - new forms of heritage materials and new platforms to store and archive material
- Technology – an existential threat to LAMs
- Increased need for demonstrating impact and Rol
- Technology – also new opportunities for assessing the impact e.g altmetrics
- Altmetrics - alternative approaches to the traditional ways of measuring impact (Priem, 2014) e.g. views, downloads, reads, tweets, mentions, engagements and many more.
- Acknowledgements – one of the altmetric indicators of impact in academic libraries

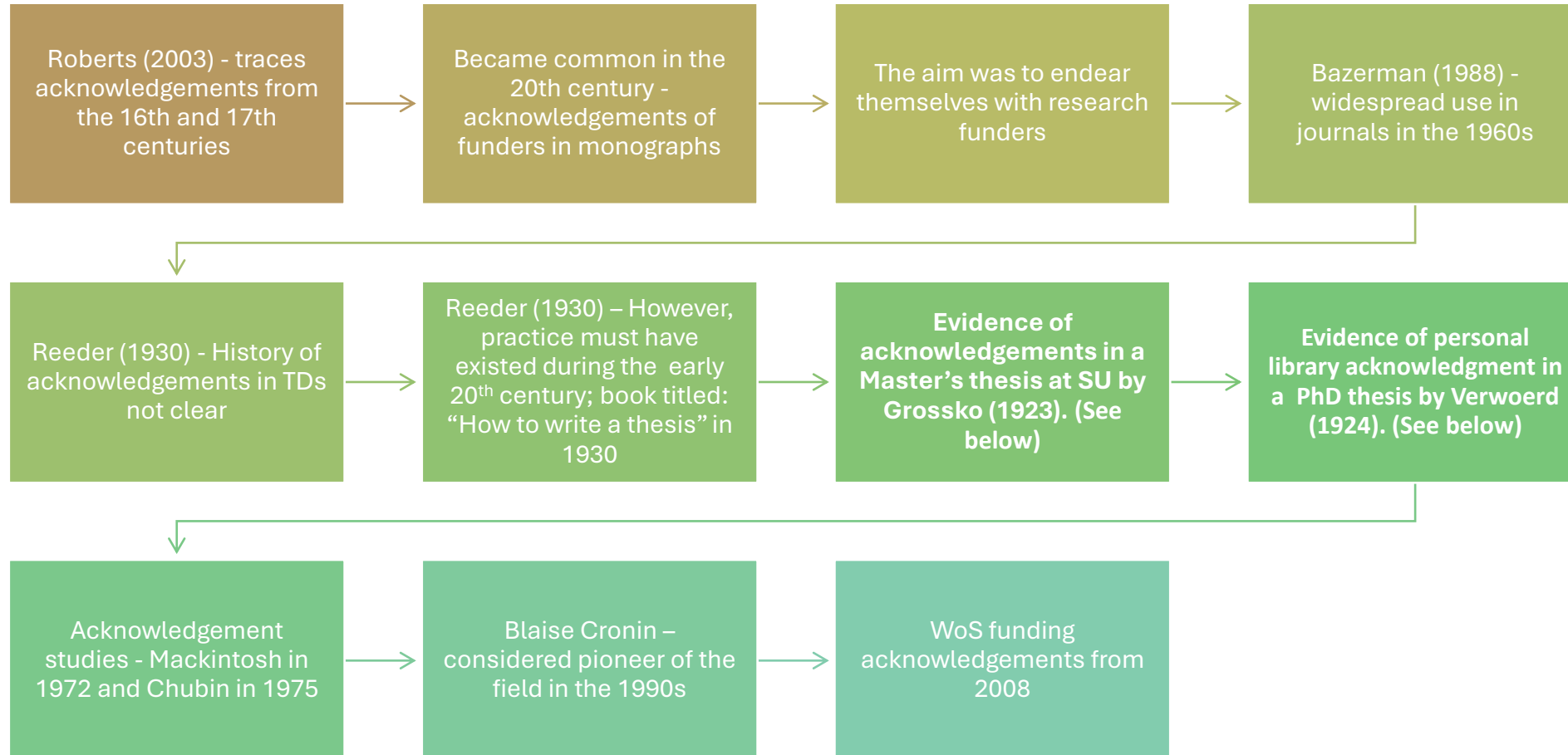
Introduction

- Acknowledgements –gratitude given to a broad range of contributors to scholarly outputs
- Provide evidence of assistance by other and introduces the student as a social being
- Acknowledgements are voluntary, often have no cumulative or scholarly value, no guidance given to students on how to write them (Adekannbi, 2023)
- Acknowledgements are cumbersome as a data source so they require careful collection and categorisation (Cronin, 2001)
- Less appeal as research assessment measures to bibliometricians and librarians (Adekannbi, 2023)
- Despite this, Hubbard et al. (2018) – used as a complementary measure of the impact of libraries and archives
- Limited studies on acknowledgements but more so those of archives and museums in scholarly publications.
- This study used acknowledgements in ETDs as a proxy to measure impact .

Objectives of the study

- explore the extent of LAM acknowledgements in Music ETDs at South African universities
- determine LAM institutions acknowledged in South African Music ETDs
- identify LAM staff acknowledged in South African Music ETDs
- categorise the acknowledgement of LAMs by South African Music students

Brief history of acknowledgements



Acknowledgement in a master's thesis at SU by Grossko (1923)

1) Aan wie, saam met sy staf, ek hierby my hartlike dank uitspreek vir die geduld en vriendelike bereidwilligheid waarmee hulle—mondeling sowel as skriftelik—alle inligtinge wat ek nodig had, steeds aan my gegee het.—

“to whom, together with his staff, I hereby express my heartfelt thanks for the patience and friendly willingness with which they continued to give me - verbally as well as in writing - all the information I needed.”

Acknowledgment in a PhD thesis by Verwoerd (1924)

- Embargoed and inaccessible ETDs were excluded

Conclusion

- Study argues that Acknowledgements in ETDs can be used to demonstrate impact of LAM institutions and individuals working in those institutions.
- However, acknowledgements should be considered as one among a plethora of assessments and measures in an impact-driven environment.
- Anecdotal evidence that acknowledgements may conform to citation principles such as the Mathew effect.
- Qualitative expressions in acknowledgment can help to demonstrate the various ways by which LAM institutions contribute to research students' success (Hubbard *et al.*, 2018).
- LAMs should consider developing their own internal acknowledgement databases that may help them to demonstrate impact.
- With the emergency of generative artificial intelligence and other tools, this database can be within the realm of possibility for many libraries.
- Such a database can serve as a springboard for a broader ETD acknowledgements database in the near future.
- The results of this study have practical and theoretical implications.
- It is possible to extract acknowledgements to LAM institutions in ETDs as a way of demonstrating the impact of these heritage institutions.



Conclusion

- LAM institutions must actively seek automated ways of extracting this important data source for the purpose of demonstrating their impacts.
- These results also point to the possibility of considering acknowledgements as alternative measures of impact parallel to citations and other altmetrics.
- Bibliometricians, therefore, have an opportunity to theorise about and conduct more studies in this promising niche.
- Furthermore, this study showed that the value of acknowledgements goes beyond the metrics but also that these qualitative expressions can serve as an opportunity to demonstrate the kind of research support that LAM institutions provide to research and education.



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
