




Gerstman's first composition







## Rani is first graduate in African Dance



Dance pioneer: Maxwell Xolani Rani will be UCT's first graduate in African Dance when he is capped in the Jameson Hall this week.

MAXWELL XOLANI Rani will be the first student in South Africa to graduate with a university degree in African Dance when he is capped this week.

The 30-year old from Nyanga recently presented Trails, a contemporary African choreography, at the School of Dance's annual showcase at the Baxter Theatre. Four years ago the School's head, Professor Elizabeth Triegaardt, introduced African Dance to the suite of programmes offered. Rani says he is honoured to be a trailblazer. "African Dance will be a subject at schools after 2005, so we have a lot of work to do in training teachers who will be able to take the subject." he told Monday Paper.

Rani also believes his achievement will serve to inspire disadvantaged pupils. "We need to break these barriers," he said. "They should see African Dance as an option and a career choice." His entry into dance was quite fortuitous. His aunt worked at the School and from a young age Rani watched the dancers perform their nimble magic. He was entranced and by the age of 12 he and his friends were dancing in the local community.

e A helping hand

WHEN MARGOT Luyte decided that she would take care of disabled Graham Clarke, a former weather reader on Marion Island, she knew that to move him about she would need either more hands, or a little assistance from modern technology.

So she approached Professor Gerald Nurick of the Centre for Computational and Applied Mechanics in the Department of Mechanical Engineering, he having assisted Clarke previously with some other mechanical innovations (See www.prentrom.com/profiles/profiledec0.html for more). Nurick posed it as a challenge to some engineering students, one taken up by graduand Richard Hahn who accepted it as his final-year project. Hahn designed and built - with Arnold Warburton of the department's workshop - an automated "crane" that can be wheeled around the house and can be used to lift Clarke from his wheelchair onto his bed - or elsewhere - and vice versa. The crane is powered by an actuator, in common use in robotics, donated by Yale Industrial

Luyte, who previously had to call in some extra people when lifting Clarke, views Hahn's invention as a lifesaver. "It will liberate our lives," she said.





#### Aquarius: Cultural Society of the National Union of South African Students (NUSAS)



"Aquarius was the culture arm of South African students to develop cultural activities particular against the struggle of opposition to apartheid.

The aim of the organisation was to bring together artists of all sorts, visual artists, musicians, writers, poets, dancers, theatre people and so on. To discuss the role of art in apartheid and to present the art. Aquarius later changed it's name to Cultural Action of the National Union of South African Students. In order to reflect it was just not about art, but art in action and culture in action.

In 1973 I was involved in the Arts Festival at the University of Witwatersrand. After that festival I was elected as National Executive as deputy of Aquarius. A year later I was then elected as the chairperson of Aquarius."


